the Library. Our topic will be "Genealogy- When You Think You Haven't Got a Clue". Megan Smolenyak Smolenyak (yes that is her real name) will bring her unique and cutting edge perspective on research into family histories, to open our 2006 series of informative sessions. Megan has been an avid genealogist since the sixth grade and is skilled in many aspects of family history research. She was selected as the lead researcher for the PBS award-winning *Ancestors* series and has consulted on many other television programs.

Megan has worked with the U.S. Army's Repatriation project since 2000. This program is using DNA samples from the relatives of servicemen killed or MIA in Korea, WW II, and Viet Nam to match against the remains that are now being repatriated. She has supported this and over 60 other genealogical initiatives through her "Honoring Our Ancestors" grants program.



Her credits include authoring four books on the subject: <u>Honoring Our Ancestors</u>, <u>In Search of Our Ancestors</u>, <u>They Came to America</u>, and <u>Trace Your Roots With DNA</u>. Formerly an international marketing consultant, she has traveled to more than 70 countries and holds a BSFS in Foreign Service from Georgetown University, MBA in International Business from George Washington University and MAS in Information Technology from Johns Hopkins University. 

RIDE THE RAIL / WALK THE TRAIL...REPORT- Thanks to Marshall Hatfield and Kay & John Fisher for this report- (ed.) On Saturday morning, October 22nd, the weather was misty with possible showers throughout the day. We didn't have alternative dates set aside, so we decided to forge ahead regardless of the weather. Trip members included Elena and Peter Hill, Kay and John Fisher (Haddon Twp. Historical Society friends), Kathy and Don Witzig, Jan Ewing and Marshall Hatfield. This was the first trip for most of us, on the Riverline light rail line connecting Camden to Trenton. Surprisingly, the train was quite full! When

we arrived in Bordentown we met our guide, Mae Silver. She led us to the bronze statue (see photo) of Thomas Paine. This is one of only five statues of Paine, the author of *Common Sense*, whose stirring words helped to convince the colonials to revolt against the British.

As we walked from the statue through the streets of Bordentown, Mae described many interesting tales about Paine and his contemporaries, Francis Hopkinson & Colonel Kirkbride. She referred to them as "disavowed" Quakers because they proposed taking up arms to achieve their political objectives. Mae pointed out the unique architecture of the historic homes, and the con-



nections those original residents had to local commerce and politics, as we made our way along Farnsworth Street.

One of the houses was the original Borden house (see photo– left). It was rebuilt after the British burned it, as a deterrent to the revolution-minded colonists. It was said that Mrs. Borden sat outside on a chair and watched her house burn to the ground, after proclaiming to the British officer in charge, "This is one of the happiest days of my life. It means the British are losing the war!" Mae commented that this may have been the original display

of the "Jersey Girl" attitude. We moved on to the Bordentown Historical Society, in the old Quaker Meeting House, and then a quick trip through the local cemetery.

We also stopped by Clara Barton's one room schoolhouse. It appeared we would only be able to see it through the windows. While we were peeking in, the local militia stopped and questioned our intents. For a while we thought our names might show up in the *Retrospect's* police reports. You see, Bordentown has been a little suspicious of non-resident groups ever since the British "house-warmings" and the May 1778

sinking of 22 ships in Crosswicks Creek, where it meets the Delaware River. Fortunately, the caretaker of the schoolhouse came to our rescue, as she lives across the street. She actually gave us the key and said just return it to her house when we were done! We finished up our day at Jester's, a local eating establishment with good food, good service and a good time had by all. Join us for our next Historical Society outing!
