OUR NEXT MEETING: Monday evening April 15th at 7:00pm in the Haddon Heights Library. The presentation at our April 2013 meeting is entitled, "The Second Battle of Princeton"- New revelations on the Battle of Princeton & preservation challenges from a proposed housing development... Our presenter will be Ms. Kip Cherry, who is 1st Vice President of the Princeton Battlefield Society. She has over 30 years of varied experience in historic preservation, urban planning and economic development. She is Chairman of the Princeton Battlefield Society's Planning Committee, which is leading PBS's efforts to save the site of the counterattack at the Battle of Princeton, which is slated for development as 15 units of faculty housing. She was Co-chair for the Society's 225th 1783 Anniversary Celebration - a three-day series of events, and managed the Society's Symposium on the Battle of Princeton (as a part of a federal grant) and its Ten Crucial Days Forum. Most recently she was Director of Marketing for Michael Graves & Associates. She graduated from Beaver College (now called Arcadia University), with a BA in English and has an MBA from the Wharton School at the University of Pennsylvania. She holds a certification from the American Institute of Certified Planners and is licensed by the State of New Jersey as a Professional Planner.

THREE MORE HISTORICAL INTERPRETIVE MARKERS TO BE DEDICATED—On April 28th, The Haddon Heights Historical Society will be dedicating our next three historical interpretive markers. Join members of the HHHS Board and the individual homeowners as these informative signs are unveiled in front of three of our four Pre-Revolutionary War homes in town. The festivities will begin at Noon on the 28th. We will meet at the Thorne-Glover Plantation House (c.1702)at 1908 New Jersey Avenue. From there, we will proceed to the John Thorne Glover house at 1212 Sylvan Avenue. Finally, we will dedicate the marker at the Colonel Joseph Ellis House (c.1720) located at 1009 Sycamore. If you can't make it to the dedications, please make it a point to stop by and read these markers when you are in the neighborhood.

#### HISTORICAL DATES IN AMERICAN HISTORY-MAY / JUNE-

- 5/1/1931 The empire State Building opens in New York City. It was the tallest skyscraper in the world
- 5/5/1961- The first American Astronaut, Alan Shepard Jr., travels 115 miles into space aboard the Mercury capsule "Freedom 7"
- 5/6/1935 President Franklin Delano Roosevelt creates the WPA (Works Project Administration), putting the nation back to work. Haddon Heights benefitted from several of these projects!
- 5/7/1915 A German submarine fires without warning on a British ocean liner, the Lusitania, which sinks off the coast of Ireland with 128 Americans among the 1198 killed.
- 5/8/1945 Celebrations erupt across America and Europe, marking V-E Day, the end of the War in Europe.
- 5/9/1914- President Woodrow Wilson proclaims the first Mother's Day, following a campaign by newspapers, clergymen, politicians, and a West Virginia woman named Ann Jarvis.
- 5/16/1866 Congress authorizes a new 5-cent coin which is soon nicknamed "the nickel".
- 5/17/1792 The first meeting of what would become the New York Stock Exchange is held at the Merchants Coffee House in New York City.
- 5/18/1852 Massachusetts passes the nation's first school attendance law; children aged 8 to 14 required to attend.
- 5/20/1932 Amelia Earhart becomes the first woman to cross the Atlantic Ocean solo by plane. Also, Pan American Airlines begins the first scheduled commercial service across the Atlantic with a flight from New York to Spain in 20 hours and 16 minutes.
- 5/21/1881 Clara Barton founds the American red Cross as a branch of the International Red Cross.
- 5/21/1927 Charles Lindbergh completes his 33 1/2 hour solo flight aboard the "Spirit of St. Louis".
- 5/23/1904- A price war breaks out among European steamship companies competing for immigrant passengers, and the price of a steerage ticket to America falls to \$10.
- 5/24/1844- Samuel F.B. Morse exclaims, "What hath God wrought?" in the first message sent over his invention, the Telegraph. One of his guests, Dolly Madison, widow of President James Madison, is invited to send the next message. "Message from Mrs. Madison- She sends her love to Mrs. Wethered."
- 5/26/1876- General George Armstrong Custer leads his 655 man cavalry regiment out of Fort Lincoln, South Dako ta toward the Little Big Horn .
- 5/30/1783 America's first daily newspaper, the Pennsylvania Evening Post, begins publication in Philadelphia.
- 5/30/1868- The first Memorial Day is observed, as General John A. Logan calls on soldiers and veterans to decorate military graves with flowers.
- 6/1/1821- Emma Willard, pioneer in higher education for women, founds the Waterford Academy for Young Ladies in Waterford, N.Y. Later, she established the nation's first college-level school for women.
- 6/2/1924- All U.S. born Indians (native Americans) are granted full American citizenship.
- 6/4/1896 The first Ford automobile is assembled in Detroit, but the road test had to be postponed because the finished car was wider than the shed in which it was built.
- 6/6/1944 "The eyes of the world are upon you", General Dwight D. Eisenhower tells troops about to cross the English Channel to land on the beaches of Normandy. "The way home is via Berlin", he said.
- 6/8/1869 A patent is granted to Ives W. McGaffey of Chicago for his invention of a "sweeping machine" that operates by suction.... A vacuum cleaner.
- 6/10/1935 Alcoholics Anonymous is founded in New York city.
- 6/14/1777 The Continental Congress agrees on a national flag with 13 stripes and 13 white stars in a field of blue.
- 6/17/1947 Pan American Airways introduces "Around the World" service for a fare of \$1,700.
- 6/19/1846 The first recorded baseball game is played in Hoboken, NJ following rules by Alexander Cartwright.
- 6/22/1944 FDR signs the G.I. Bill, formally known as the Servicemen's Readjustment Act.
- 6/28/1904- Helen Keller, blind and deaf, graduates with honors from Radcliffe College. Keller has already become a celebrity through the publication of her inspiring autobiography.
- 6/30/1948 Bell Labs announces the development of the transistor as a substitute for radio tubes.
