

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

RESCHEDULED HISTORICAL SOCIETY FALL OUTING- Please join us as we continue our education on the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Battle of Gettysburg. at the historic Union League of Philadelphia, on Saturday November 2nd for a tour and luncheon (for the first 30 paid sign-ups). We will meet at Broad & Sansom Streets (140 South Broad St., Phila. PA 19102) in front of the League, at 12 noon. Our guide is Jim Mundy, Director of Education and Programming Foundations of the UL. A lunch will be served in the Café Meredith followed by a grand tour of the League's collection of Civil War historic art & artifacts. The tour will end at the new Sir John Templeton Heritage Center which is a "hands on" museum done at your own speed. The PATCO weekend schedule lists westbound trains on Saturday at 11:21 and 11:36 from Haddonfield station to 12-13<sup>th</sup> Locust. In order to sign-up, please bring your check for \$25, to our meeting on October 21st. Please note that this trip & tour is partially subsidized by the Society (donation to Abraham Lincoln Foundation) and is limited by the League to 30 people only. All participants NEED TO BE PAID IN ADVANCE. Men must wear collared shirt with jacket (tie not required).

## Haddon Heights Rail History Highlights- West Jersey Chapter, National Railway Historical Society

1877: Construction of the narrow gage Philadelphia & Atlantic City Railroad is completed. The first train from Camden to Atlantic City thru Haddon Heights is operated on July 9, 1877.

1883: The Philadelphia & Reading Railroad (P&R) acquires control of the Philadelphia & Atlantic City Railroad (P&AC) at a foreclosure sale. P&R installs standard gauge rails on the P&AC line in 1884.

1889: Philadelphia & Reading forms the Atlantic City Railroad, a subsidiary which absorbs the Philadelphia & Atlantic City effective April 1st. A second main track is laid to create a double track railroad between Camden—Atlantic City.



1890: The Haddon Heights passenger station is constructed at Station Ave.

1903: Public Service acquires the Camden & Suburban Railway Company and completes construction of the trolley line to Haddon Heights. Regular trolley service between Camden and Haddon Heights beings on July 14th.

1906: The Haddon Heights freight station is constructed, replacing an earlier structure. Most of the foodstuffs, hardware, farm implements, and etc. for local consumption, arrived in town on the railroad and were dispatched to the local stores either via the freight station or a track leading to the Frederick Fries Co.

1907: The extension of the trolley line from Haddon Heights to Clementon is completed. Regular service between Camden and Clementon begins on May 30th.

1922: The Atlantic City Railroad installs a third main track on its main line between Haddon Heights and Magnolia, a distance of 2.6 miles, to allow faster scheduling of express passenger trains to the shore. The NO tower is constructed just south of Green Street to control train movements thru Haddon Heights.

1927-1931: A new concrete overpass is constructed at Kings Highway, replacing an older structure. Also during this period, the pedestrian overpass at Green Street and the pedestrian underpass at Garden Street are constructed.

1933-1934: Pennsylvania-Reading Seashore Lines is formed thru the consolidated of Pennsylvania Railroad and Reading Railroad subsidiaries operating in Southern New Jersey. The railroads took this action to remain viable in the face of declining business brought on by the Great Depression. The NO tower is closed and both the tower and third main track thru Haddon Heights are dismantled.

1935: Regular service on the Public Service trolley line is discontinued on September 1st due to declining ridership as a result of the Great Depression and development of public highways. An infrequent franchise car is operated until 1937 to retain the franchise to operate the line. The line is permanently taken out of service and effectively abandoned in 1937. Note: The substation originally constructed to service the trolley line still stands on East Atlantic Avenue and continues in operation by Public Service.

1953: The Pennsylvania Reading Seashore Line Clementon Branch (renamed former ACRR Main Line) is reduced from double track to single main track thru Haddon Heights effective November 24.

1965: The final regularly scheduled passenger trains to serve Haddon Heights, Nos. 609 and 610, operating between Camden and Clementon, are discontinued by PRSL on July 16. The Haddon Heights station agency remains open to service the local freight traffic.

1976: Consolidated Rail Corporation is created by Congress to absorb the rail assets of seven bankrupt northeastern railroads and the PRSL. The railroad thus formed is known as Conrail; the use of all previous railroad names in the system is discontinued.

1980: The Haddon Heights passenger station is closed as a freight agency. Subsequently, the Communications and Signals Department of Conrail moves into the building. During the 1980's, the former freight station is sold and still exists as a private business.

2006: The Communications and Signals Department relocated from the Haddon Heights passenger Station to Woodbury. The Delaware and Susquehanna Model Railroad Club leases the station from Conrail for its headquarters and embarks on an aggressive restoration program. Their efforts are keeping the 120 plus year old landmark a vital part of life along Station Ave.
