

RELIVE THE BATTLE OF GLOUCESTER - Please join us on Monday July 16th at 7pm as we welcome Garry Wheeler Stone, Ph.D. who will be speaking to us about the Battle of Gloucester. Fought between November 25th and November 26th, 1777 during the Philadelphia Campaign of the American Revolutionary War, it was the first battlefield command for the French Marquis de Lafayette. British General William Howe sought to gain control of the Delaware River as far north as the city of Philadelphia. After the Battle of Red Bank, Howe sent part of his army across the Delaware to Gloucester under the command of Lord Cornwallis, to take Fort Mercer.

George Washington reacted to this move by detaching forces under the command of General Nathaniel Green just north of Gloucester. Greene was accompanied by a young French officer, the Marquis de Lafayette, who had fought with Washington in the Battle of Brandywine. General Greene sent Lafayette out on a reconnaissance mission to scout the location and strength of Cornwallis' army. Lafayette's 350 man force staged a surprise attack on a forward picket of Hessian soldiers, catching them completely unprepared. As Cornwallis sent some Grenadier soldiers to provide covering fire, the Hessians retreated back to the main British camp. Lafayette and his men withdrew and rejoined General Greene and the rest of the Continental Army group. Word of Lafayette's leadership and minimal losses of men in this battle was instrumental in a decision by Congress to award him a commission as a Major General in the Continental Army.

The building was built in 1917-18 and designed by local architects in the Classical

Revival architectural style. The library was declared a historic landmark by the City of Santa Monica Landmarks Commission in May, 1977.

While closer to home, we toured The Museum of the American Revolution which has a wonderful new exhibit. Did you ever wonder what life was like in Philadelphia during the Revolutionary War? The Museum's new discovery center brings to life the diverse Old City neighborhood during the 1700's. It invites visitors of all ages to learn through hands on exploration. I found it a fun based learning experience! Come and learn more about history at our July meeting!!!!!!!!!

HERE'S TO LOOKING UP YOUR DEAD RELATIVES! I understand the Haddon Heights Library now has access to Ancestry.com. You can go to the Library and begin/continue research into your own personal history. My mother was adopted and never wanted to know anything about her birth family. Respecting her wishes, I never inquired about my ancestors—half of my gene pool, until long after my mom passed away. I was so surprised to find the original Catholic Diocese adoption service in Indianapolis, Ind., had maintained records back to 1933 when Mom was born and given up for adoption! ANOTHER REFLECTION ON HADDON HEIGHTS HISTORY— In my closing of each issue of this newsletter, I ask the same thing of the readers; Please write down your memories and share them with your family. Also, it would be appreciated if you also send them to me so I can print them for others to read. Well, my friend Lynn Dalton heard my plea, took up a pen (yes the old fashioned way to commit things to paper), and sent me a story she remembers. I am pleased to present it to you here:

Way back in the 50's, 1950-57, to be exact, I rode the #51 Public Service Bus from Camden (it went to Philadelphia) to the end of the line, where I lived, every day of the week. On the corner of White Horse Pike and Station Avenue– Haddon Savings Bank (est.1905, and my bank for 55 years), had a sign on their front lawn. It read: "If you lived in the Borough of Haddon Heights, you would be home now!"

I read that sign so many times during my daily trips. I went to high school in Camden (CCHS'53), and worked in Camden at the Esterbrook Pen Company. Remember fountain pens? I truly believe that sign was embedded subliminally in my brain because when John and I were married– December 7, 1957, we had our wedding reception at the Friendly House Restaurant- corner of Station Avenue and White Horse Pike; across Station Avenue from Haddon Savings. We lived in an apartment on Haddon Avenue in Collingswood for nine months, but when we began searching for our first house, we picked Haddon Heights!

I truly believe a little voice in the back of my mind guided us to Haddon Heights; a decision we never regretted. We moved into a small bungalow- 2 bedrooms, on Keswick Avenue (1958-1964). In 1964, we bought our "raise the family" home on Maple Avenue (1964-1990). We then made our move to Crest Avenue

where I still live (1990-20??). Who knows— maybe that little voice will guide me again! John and I really enjoyed our time in Haddon Heights. It is a great town to raise a family. We always felt we had made a very good decision. I am sure our four children agree. John is gone now— he passed away in June, 2014, hopefully to a more wonderful place than Haddon heights— is there one???? I plan to stay on Crest Avenue for hopefully the rest of my days. Haddon Heights is home to this "Philadelphia Girl"! I have enjoyed sitting here reminiscing about my time and years in my favorite town. Lynne Dalton
